

Commercial Driver's License (CDL-A) Spring 2022

Do you wish that the open road could be your office? Do you like having the freedom of being on the go and spending time on the road? Getting your Commercial Driver's License (CDL) can open the door to a variety of professional opportunities – not all of which include long-distance or over-the road trucking. Employment of heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers is projected to grow 5 percent from 2014 to 2024.*

This course provides classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction with a focus on safety, to educate and prepare students for entry-level driving jobs with an emphasis on being a company driver. A Class-A CDL License can be used to transition to several related careers, such as becoming a supervisor, a recruiter, or an owner operator.

Program Details

- NCC's CDL program is offered in partnership with 160 Driving Academy, a respected national CDL training provider
- The program can be completed in 4 -5 weeks. New classes start every Monday.
- Class A students are prepared to take the necessary exams to obtain a Commercial Driver's License to operate a Class A vehicle; successful students will earn a Class A CDL with air brakes, hazardous materials, tank, and doubles/ triples endorsements.

Interested Participants Must:

- ✓ be at least 18 years of age, have a valid driver's license, and be authorized to
 work in the United States.
- ✓ be able to read and speak the English language and be able to obtain a PA or NJ CDL written knowledge permit.
- ✓ be able to pass a Department of Transportation Physical and a Federal Chain of Custody Drug Screen.
