Program Narrative

Special Education is an important and exciting career for persons interested in the education of young children and students with disabilities. Northampton Community College's Special Education Program prepares students to meet the competencies and qualifications established by the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA) and related state laws and standards. The program is grounded in a philosophy and framework that values diversity, equity, and inclusive practices, provides multiple family and disability perspectives, collaborative relationships, and emphasizes evidence-based practices and effective educational approaches, including Universal Design for Learning (UDL).

Features

Graduates of the Special Education A.A. program are qualified to: transfer to a 4 year college or university to pursue a bachelor's degree and/or teacher certification in special education; enter the workforce prepared in the competencies to be employed as a special education paraeduator in education settings. These settings include classrooms that support children of varying abilities from pre-k through age 21

- Practice being an advocate, a role model, and supporter of learners of varying abilities by upholding high professional standards in diverse educational
 environments.

A student must maintain a grade of "C" or better in all Special Education courses.
