Notes:

- Take the science elective before the math elective so that you rule in, or rule out, the allied health pathway.
- While all English II classes further a student's skills in research, English II has three versions: technical pathways generally favor the "technical writing" version of English II; business pathways may require the "report-writing" version of English II; and most other pathways accept or require the "literature" version of English II. Discuss with your Academic Advisor.
- Pick one communications elective (list on last page).
- The Mathematics (QL) and Laboratory Science electives must be selected from the list of approved General Education courses in each of those categories. Science-oriented pathways will require College Algebra (MATH140); liberal arts or communication or business pathways will require or suggest statistics (MATH150).
- Students must select one course from the list of approved General Education Electives in each of the following three categories: Arts and Humanities (AH), Social Science: Societies and Institutions over Time (SIT), and Social Science: Scientific Study of Human Behavior (SSHB).
- **One course should be designated as Diversity and Global Awareness (D).**
- **One General Education Elective must be taken in a Writing Intensive (WI) section. In addition, students must select a second Writing Intensive (WI) course.**
- ***two 200-level courses must come from Social/Cultural Studies electives or Communication elective**
- **Career Services: If you are undecided, schedule an appointment with Career Services for career exploration and possibly take an interest inventory.**
- **It's never too early to begin working on your resume – meet with Career Services to help you get started, check out Optimal Resume, and our Job Hunter's Guide.**

- Northampton's General Studies major allows you to explore a variety of fields and to discover what subjects suit you best. Upon completion, you will be prepared to transfer to a four-year institution to complete a bachelor's degree in the major of your choice.

Schools that are a part of the Pennsylvania state college and university system will accept all of your credits; however, if you wish to attend another school, we suggest you choose elective courses that are transferable to the institution of your choice. We encourage you to work closely with your academic advisor, as well as the transfer advisor in the Office of Academic Advising, to ensure your greatest opportunity for a smooth and successful transition to a four-year institution.
